During the month of June, we celebrate Flag Day, June 14th. Lately I have received a lot of questions regarding why our flags are flown at half-staff. So, in honor of Flag Day I decided to review the protocol for flying the flag at half-staff. The American Flag is flown at half-staff on the following days each year:

May 15th Peace Officers Memorial Day
Memorial Day half-staff until noon only
July 27th Korean War Veterans Armistice Day
September 11 Patriot Day
December 7th Peral Harbor Day

Additional day or days throughout the year the flag may be flown at half-staff by the order of the President of the United States and the Governor of the State of Vermont.

VVH receives email notifications from various sources when the flags should be lowered to half-staff and for how long they are to remain that way. You can receive email or text notifications with this information from most vendors who sell American flags.

I hope this helps to clear up the confusion about this topic.

Per State and Federal Regulations all Veterans and Members who smoke at VVH must have a smoking assessment completed. At no time may a VVH nursing home resident keep a lighter, matches, etc. in their rooms. These ***must*** be kept with their nurse. Cigarettes may be left with the Veteran or Member as outlined in their smoking assessment. Please check with your loved one's nurse prior to leaving any cigarettes in their rooms.

In an effort to help reduce identity theft, the federal government is removing social security numbers from Medicare cards. The new cards will have an individual identification number. It is very important the facility receive a copy of this new card to ensure timely and accurate billing. **Please drop off or mail a copy of the card to our Finance Office.**



Dear All,



On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution which stated:

“Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation.”

**“You're a grand old flag, you're a high flying flag
And forever in peace may you wave.
You're the emblem of the land I love.
The home of the free and the brave.
Ev'ry heart beats true 'neath the Red, White and Blue,
Where there's never a boast or brag.
Should auld acquaintance be forgot, keep your eye on the grand old flag.”**

What a way to start the month of June! Reading the resolution from the Second Continental Congress in 1777 and words from George M. Cohan's song written 112 years ago in 1906. June 14th is Flag Day and it is a great time to remember the flag that all of you have bravely served and fought for. Over the course of our nation's history, we have had many flags. The Betsy Ross Flag, Gadsden Flag (Don't Tread On Me), and many others that have graced our streets, houses, and public buildings. Our soldiers proudly wear it on their shoulders to show the world who we are, in both times of war and peace. To me it is real interesting that we never hear of other countries flags being desecrated or burned.

Whenever some people or organizations do not like the USA or our beliefs, what do they do? Protest, burn, and stomp on our Flag. I think they believe that weakens us when, in actuality, it makes us stronger.

I absolutely love seeing the flag flown on the George Washington Bridge in New York City; seeing it fly in foreign countries as my travels have taken me to Greece, France, and Italy. Seeing it at Lafayette's grave in Paris and the US military cemetery at Normandy, France, brought tears to my eyes. We have seen it supported by two fire trucks at local events and look no further than the entrance to the Vermont Veterans' Home now. The US flags are flying all the way to your home.

However, for me the greatest US Flag anywhere is when I return from my foreign travels and see it hanging at the Customs station at the airport. Then I know I am home. Francis Scott Key wrote it so eloquently following the battle at Fort McHenry in 1814 with the following words, “O say does that star-spangled banner yet wave, O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.”

Keep the flag waving high in the breeze, our hands over our hearts when the National Anthem is played, and stand when it goes by us in a parade.

God Bless each of you and God Bless America.


