

Happy Almost Summer!!

Recently I have received numerous emails and Facebook messages questioning why our flags are at half-staff. With Flag Day being June 14th I thought this was a good time to do an American Flag 101.

- Unless properly illuminated, flags should only be displayed outdoors from sunrise to sunset.
- Flags should be raised briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- When displaying the American Flag with other flags, the American Flag should always be flown at the highest peak and should be raised first and lowered last.
- When the American Flag is displayed indoors:
 - ◊ On a speaker's platform displayed flat, it should be directly behind the speaker. When displayed on a pole, it should be in a place of prominence and to the speaker's right when he/she is facing the audience. All other flags go to the left of the speaker.
- Flags are flown at half-staff annually on the following dates:
 - ◊ May 15th Peace Officers Memorial Day
 - ◊ Memorial Day Half-staff until noon than raise to the top of the staff
 - ◊ July 27th Korean War Veterans Armistice Day
 - ◊ September 11th Patriots Day
 - ◊ December 7th Pearl Harbor Day
- By the order of the President flags are flown at half-staff.
- By the order of the Governor flags are flown at half-staff.
- Flags should always be in good repair and never touch the ground.
 - ◊ Local scout troops and various Veteran and community organizations have flag retirement ceremonies. Please contact them to properly retire your old flag, they should not be thrown out in the trash.



I hope this answers many of the question we have received regarding our flags. We will do our best to post on Facebook why are flags have been lowered to half-staff.



In the Book of Leviticus we read *“proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof.”* These immortal words are found engraved on the famed “Liberty Bell” in Philadelphia.

The Declaration of Independence declares, *“We hold these truths to be self-evident that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.”* Note what this statement does not say. As Calvin Coolidge has said, *“The nation which forgets its defenders will be itself forgotten.”* As we look forward to our Independence Day, may it never be said that we have forgotten our Nation’s defenders! 
