The Benefits of Open Access to the Outdoors



Here at VVH we are very lucky to have the outdoor space and grounds that we do. Research shows that people with dementia who spend more time participating in outdoor activity have improved sleep and less agitation. Additionally, those who spend more time outdoors generally need less psychiatric medication and have a reduction in falls (quantity and severity). To sum it up – spending time outdoors is good for both physical and mental health!

On Cardinal Point, our licensed special care unit for dementia, we have a beautiful, enclosed, outdoor space which has recently been named "Freedom Park." The goal is to create a recreational space, unrecognizable from any park you would find in the general community. Planned additions to the park include increased seating, garden beds, musical as well as water elements. We also want to replace the existing fence with a safe, yet aesthetically pleasing, more home-like fence. If making a donation to the Home, please consider designating it for this purpose.

The Price of Freedom – after the signing 1776

Chaplain's Corner

THEY PAID THE PRICE Americans, you know the 56 men who signed our Declaration of Independence that first 4th of July--you know they were risking everything, don't you? Because if they won the war with the British, there would

be years of hardship as a struggling nation. If they lost, they would face a hangman's noose. And yet there where it says, "We herewith pledge, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor," they did sign. But did you know that they paid the price?

When **Carter Braxton** of Virginia signed the Declaration of Independence, he was a wealthy planter and trader but thereafter he saw his ships swept from the seas and to pay his debts, he lost his home and all his property. He died in rags. **Thomas Lynch, Jr.**, a third-generation rice grower and owner of a large plantation, was an aristocrat but after he signed his health failed. He and his wife set out for France to regain his failing health. Their ship never got to France; he was never heard from again. **Thomas McKean** of Delaware was so harassed by the enemy that he was forced to move his family five times in five months. He served in Congress without pay, his family in poverty and in hiding. Vandals looted the properties of **8 additional signers**.

Thomas Nelson, Jr. of Virginia raised two million dollars on his own signature for provisions for our allies, the French fleet. After the War he personally paid back the loans wiping out his entire estate but was never reimbursed by his government. In the final battle for Yorktown, Nelson urged General Washington to fire on his (Nelson's) own home then occupied by Cornwallis. He died bankrupt.

Others suffered as a result of their loyalty: Francis Hopkinson's home was seized; Francis Lewis' home and possessions were destroyed and his wife imprisoned dying a few months later. Richard Stockton was captured and mistreated, his health broken and his estate pillaged. Thomas Heyward, Jr. was captured when Charleston fell. John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside while she was dying; their thirteen children fled in all directions for their lives. Lewis Morris saw his land destroyed; his family scattered. Philip Livingston died within a few months of hardships of the War. John Hancock, history remembers best, was one of the wealthiest men in New England. He stood outside Boston one terrible night of the War and said, "Burn Boston, though it makes John Hancock a beggar, if the public good requires it." Of the 56 signers of the Declaration, few were long to survive. Five were captured by the British and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes sacked and looted, occupied by the enemy or burned. Two lost their sons in the Army; one had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 died in the War from its hardships or from its more merciful bullets.

I don't know what impression you would have had of these men who met that hot summer in Philadelphia, but I think it's important this July 4, that we remember this about them: they were not poor men, they were not wild-eyed pirates. These were men of means; most of them were rich men who enjoyed the luxury in personal living. Not hungry men--prosperous men, wealthy landowners, substantially secure in their prosperity. But they considered liberty is so much more important than security that they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor. They fulfilled their pledge--they paid the price, and freedom was born. (edited from SOURCE: Paul Harvey, News and Commentary. July 4, 1974.)
