Hope for Broken Lives

- You and I live in a world filled with brokenness. With all the hurt and
 heartache in our world, it can be easy to start wondering, "Is there any hope?"
- Like us, the prophet Jeremiah lived in a time of great hopelessness. God's
 people had turned away from Him, the nation faced political upheaval and many Jews had been sent
- off in captivity to Babylon. Brokenness, heartache and pain were everywhere... sound familiar?
- We find a living illustration of hope for broken lives in Jeremiah 18: "Arise, and go down to the
- potter's house, and there I will let you hear my words." So I went down to the potter's house, and
- there he was working at his wheel. And the vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's
- hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as it seemed good to the potter to do.
- Pottery is one of the oldest, most ancient arts and remains virtually unchanged from its earliest conception and is passed down through generations. The potter puts a lump of clay on the wheel
- and turns it and shapes it into a vessel. <u>The clay represents you and me</u>. Clay is drab and is
- basically worthless in and of itself. There's no beauty in the clay but when God gets His hands on
- it, He breaks us, shapes us, and makes us valuable and beautiful and useful.
- <u>God's potter's wheel represents the daily turns and twists of life</u>. When we, the clay, are tossed
 onto the wheel of life and begin to turn, the Master Craftsman begins to shape us sometimes
- speeding up the wheel, sometimes slowing it down. We are not simply going around in circles
- because God is guiding us through our life's journey and you can be certain that none of your
- experiences are wasted but are part of God's plan.
- If there is a defect that shows up in the vessel, you can imagine the frown on the potter's face. The
- wheel slows and his hands cease moving as he finds something in the clay, a stiffness or brittleness,
- that is a defiance to the potter's plans. Maybe this defect represents a resistance to God's plan and you are holding back, pushing Him away which is affecting His design for your life.
- Thank God that is not the end of the story. The Master Craftsmen has a tool up his sleeve grace.
- When the vessel was spoiled, what did God do? Did He throw it away? No! He reworked it... He
- reshaped it into another vessel. He did not simply mend it. He made it anew into something
- beautiful and unimagined. You do not just get a fresh start, you get a brand-new life in Christ! It is that marvelous grace, that majestic, magnificent grace, that remakes you from the inside out.



So my friend, be encouraged today - the divine Potter making all things new! He will do that in you because failure in your life never has to be final when you put your life in the Master's hands.
