Happy Fall!!

As the fall season approaches this is a good time to provide a few seasonal reminders:

Holiday Meals:

Guests are invited to our noon meal on Thanksgiving and Christmas. The first guest is free and each additional guest is \$10. The deadline to RSVP for Thanksgiving is November 13th, and for Christmas, December 13th.

Holiday Decorations:

Per fire code:

- Real corn stalks, hay bales, garlands, wreaths and trees are not permitted inside the facility.
- ♦ All lights used must be UA approved and extension cords are not permitted.
- Decorations cannot interfere with the operation of the door, it must be able to be closed in a single motion – to ensure the door closes properly some decorations may need to be removed and are not permitted.
- Decorations cannot be hung from sprinkler heads or in locations that interfere with the sprinkler head. We are required to keep the area 18 inches from the ceiling clear of any decorations.

Gifts for Staff:

State and Federal law prohibits our staff from accepting individual gifts. Individual cards or food that can be shared with the entire neighborhood are permitted. Please do not put the staff in the awkward position of having to decline your gift, it makes them very uncomfortable, and they do not want to hurt your feelings.

We have several holiday events coming up. We hope to see you at these events.

THAT'S ONE BIG TURTLE.

An Audience of ONE



There is an incredibly understated theme all throughout biblical history that I have recently uncovered. It has gone virtually unnoticed because we live in a culture that believes if we are not popular, loved, or accepted by everyone, we are not popular, loved, and accepted by anyone. We

underestimate the impact our influence can have even on a small scale.

With celebrities, performers and athletes drawing crowds of thousands and having social media followers in the millions, we undervalue the importance of small-scale interactions; the upclose and personal, one-on-one encounters we have almost all of the time. We can tend to feel if we cannot do it on a grand-scale, it is simply not worth doing.

I am so glad God never felt this way about us! While we were yet sinners, Christ loved us and gave His life for us. When we had nothing to offer in return, Christ chose to make the first move toward our redemption.

This theme is important because many of these seemingly small inconsequential interactions resulted in transformational and pivotal moments in people's lives. I call these encounters, An Audience of ONE. Abraham was called out of the family idol-making business to become the Father of Many Nations. Jacob wrestled his "Angel" and became the father of the Israelite Nation. Noah and Moses became unintentional leaders.

No large crowds. No big venues. Just a one-on-one, up-close and personal, intimate Audience of ONE not only with Jesus but with the Angels that He sent as his messengers to Mary, who became the Mother of Christ or Zechariah and Elizabeth who were elderly parents of John the Baptist.

It is my sincerest belief, Friends, that Jesus still desires these one-on-one intimate conversations with His followers. I believe He still invites us to have an Audience of ONE with Him on a daily basis. Without these small interactions how can we ever expect to have the monumental impact our predecessors did? It is just not possible.

Today, do not underestimate the impact your Audience of ONE can have with God. It is likely to become the most transformational moment of your entire life and could potentially have an impact upon you, your family and those you lead, for generations to come.



Albert Einswine and Marilyn Swine-roe, therapy pigs, made the rounds and brought smiles to all who met the porcine guests.






























Pigs can make great therapy animals as pigs have a sweet nature and are willing to be cuddled by people, which makes them great emotional support animals.
