



Our goal is to have **ZERO** outbreaks throughout the winter months, let’s do it together!! We need everyone’s help.

Several of our Veterans here at VVH are fellow cold weather warriors...and we all know those that fought in the Korean War know well the effects of extremely cold weather on both people and equipment in combat as do many of our WW II European Theater Warriors.

Our equipment has improved drastically the last twenty or so years. The invention of Gore-Tex was probably the single most important development to improve cold weather sustainability and comfort. Being waterproof, as compared to the wool and cotton I began my Marine Corps career with, has totally enhanced comfort and survivability in extreme conditions. Improvements with the layering system of clothing and boots are almost as impressive.

A SALUTE TO MILITARY BRATS via THE DANDELION—PART 2

As a medicine it filters the liver, removes toxins from the blood, and is helpful in treating anemia, hepatitis, arthritis, rheumatism, scurvy, warts, hives, eczema—in a nutshell, almost every ailment that would plague the newcomers. They did not know why the dandelion could treat so many ailments; they only knew that it did, in fact, work. Today, researchers in Canada are having great success with using a dandelion coffee to treat cancer. There are even whispers of a cure for some blood cancers.

There are one hundred species of dandelion and all are beneficial. Rich in vitamins and minerals, the dandelion has more Vitamin A than spinach (hear that, Popeye?), more Vitamin C than tomatoes. It is also a good source of iron, calcium, potassium, niacin, magnesium, sodium and the list goes on. Now, we know what the Puritans did not; we know why the dandelion worked for their ailments.

Every part of the dandelion is useful. In the spring, after a long, hard winter the dandelion is the first to open its flowers to attract the honey bee with its nectar. Although bitter like chicory or endive, its flowers, leaves, and roots can be eaten: roasted, fried, baked into pancakes, etc. Its stem oozes a milky white substance, a latex, that can be chewed like gum, used as a mosquito repellent, and as a substitute for rubber. Its flowers can be made into a tea or a coffee, or wine, or a soothing facial cream. Yellow, green, and purple dyes can also be prepared using the plant. And the puffball of seeds? They are for wishes!

TWIG REMEMBERS...

Back home in Fair Haven, Vermont, 14 miles west of Rutland, I had 17 years of columns in the Lakes Region Free Press titled “Twig Remembers” in which I would write about friends who had passed on. In them I would write about how the person related to each other during our long friendships. It gave me a place to write some very special stories that were often very funny. I plan on dropping one in the Buzz Word now and then. Here goes: Twig Remembers Frank Chizmar.

Late 1940’s, local electrician Bud Beach sent a letter to the University of Chicago asking for a top-rated electrical student to help bring power to most of the houses in Fair Haven and Poultney (population 2,500 each). Bud Beach set up John with the local electric company (Petelle Electric). Best move John ever made was getting his brother-in-law Frank Chizmar to come and work.

Frank had grown up on a farm back in the 1930’s and 40’s. Now this was when farm kids could fix anything with a roll of baling twine and some coat hangers. If a tractor broke down, they’d take it apart, find out what was wrong, and find a way to fix it. John was a very bright bookkeeper and businessman, and Frank worked in the shop patching and fixing all kinds of machinery and electric motors for all kinds of people from all over Rutland county: \$50 versus a \$500 new unit—the word was out.

Now that old farm boy had a hankering for pies (apple, blueberry, it didn’t matter), square dancing and the ladies. Now going into people’s houses to fix things could get you a lot of those last two. So, I’m working at Poultney’s Williams’ Hardware and Frank would come in looking for weird pieces of hardware that would help him with a project. When he gathered his stuff, he would tell me how he would bend it and shape it and by tapping a couple of holes and inserting a couple of thumb screws, he would fix this old girl’s favorite oven to make her pies.

One day this very attractive lady who was brand new to the area, was in her late 50’s, but she was all there. In conversation she told me that her husband had passed on five years back and she had stayed on in Pennsylvania and was lonely thinking of him in that house, so she decided to move to Poultney, Vermont, where she had gone to college. Then she asked if I knew someone who could fix her favorite stove as they had stopped making them and it was perfect for her baking but the door had grown crooked and she couldn’t get it to close completely. I gave her Frank’s phone number and told her he was fair and honest. I also mentioned he might want to sample a very special pie she’d be baking that day.

A couple days later Frank stopped in to tell me about this very special Pennsylvania Dutch apple pie that she flavored with spiced blueberries-“best I ever had”. He shopped for a few things, and then as he headed out the door, he stopped and said, “Hey, Twig, thanks” and gave me a big wink of the eye. To this very day, I don’t exactly know what that wink was for – or do I? I guess I’ll let you people figure that one out. But don’t forget... “Twig Remembers”
