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From the Administrator... Melissa Jackson

Dear Family Members,

VVH is working hard to reinstitute communal dining and group activities. We have completed the update and development of policies associated with these items. Our biggest challenge now is how to ensure those Veterans and Members who want to eat in a dining room can do so. The capacity in our dining rooms will be reduced due to social distancing requirements and Patriot Hall can only be used for one neighborhood at a meal. The current guidelines prohibit the comingling of Veterans and Members from different neighborhoods for any reason. We have established a "task force" to work through these issues and hope to have a final plan in the next few weeks.

We continue with outdoor and window visits. Outdoor visits need a 48-hour notice. I know there have been some issues with getting through to the individual scheduling these visits and in those cases we are waving the 48-hour notice. Additional outdoor visit reminders:

- 1. Only those who are pre-screened and listed on the visitation log can visit.**
- 2. Only 2 visitors per Veteran or Member at a time.**
- 3. No physical contact or passing of items.**

Window visits are allowed but the window must remain closed. I have been asked what the difference is between a window visit and an outdoor visit if people are social distancing and wearing a facial covering. The biggest difference is your loved one is inside the facility and an open window places many more Veterans and Members at risk for the potential of acquiring COVID. Additionally, the guidance we are receiving is that the windows must remain closed during these visits.

I realize these are not favorable conditions for a visit but they are the guidelines established by the Health Department. If we have one case of COVID in the building all visits will stop for a minimum of 28 days, again per the guidance from the Health Department. We are working hard to mitigate the risk of the suspension of visits and we ask that you continue to do your part as well.

Flu season will be here before you know it. Consents for flu vaccinations will be sent out shortly to those family members who make health care decisions for their Veteran or Members. Various articles and recommendations from the CDC are strongly encouraging the flu vaccination this year, unless medically contraindicated. Please do not hesitate to reach out to your loved one's nurse if you have questions or concerns regarding the flu vaccination.

Thank you for your continued support of our staff and their efforts to keep your loved one safe. We appreciate your patience as we work through the bumps along the road of visitation.

Like everything else during COVID-19, Bennington Battle Day was different this time around. Most of this year's ceremony occurred on the historic grounds of our Vermont Veterans' Home.

The Battle of Bennington is significant in its lasting contribution to the outcome of the Revolutionary War. The battle itself was not large by historical measures; however, the British were supposed to overcome the rebel forces with ease. They did not, and this reversal of fortunes severely hampered their chances for success in Saratoga. The Battle of Bennington added inspiration and momentum to the American effort and is perceived as a catalyst to final victory against the British Empire.

Members of the 2nd Continental Artillery of the Sons of the American Revolution fired several volleys from their cannon, and an HH-60M Blackhawk helicopter from the Vermont National Guard landed on our property for those in attendance to see up close.



mask, and with flu season right around the corner, to advertise the importance of receiving the flu vaccine - especially this year!

Edna agreed to complete some drawings of each and what a job she did!





Thank you, Edna, for stepping up to the plate. What a nice job!!!


